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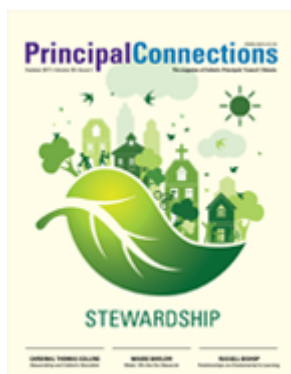

She also asks us to help our students become as knowledgeable as possible about the human water crisis we face and the root causes behind it.
